Playground Supervision

Parents/carers are reminded that playground supervision starts at 8.45am and children should not enter the playground until after this time.

School Uniform

School uniform is an important part of our identity at Crosshouse and we work hard to ensure that children understand the reasons for having a school uniform. Please be advised that leggings, jogging bottoms and hoodies are not part of our school uniform. We have noticed a number of children wearing branded sports clothing to PE. Our PE uniform policy is a red polo/Tshirt and navy/black shorts. Children are permitted to wear black or navy jogging bottoms if they are going outside for PE.

Football Colours

Football colours are not allowed in school. This includes lunchboxes, pencil cases and other accessories.

Parents' Evening Changes

Many thanks to the parents/carers that took the time to complete the parents' evening survey. To date we have received 88 responses and the feedback has been extremely helpful.

We were asked by parents/carers last year to move parents' evening forward to give parents and children sufficient time, in the school year to work on the next steps identified. We agreed that teachers would report to parents every term as follows:

Term 2 - Parents' Evening

Term 3 - Report Cards

71.6% of respondents said they preferred parents night earlier in the year and 20.5% said they didn't know. 100% agreed that access to assessment folders helped them to understand their child's attainment levels and progress.

School Improvements - Outdoor Learning

Curriculum for Excellence offers opportunities for all children and young people to enjoy first-hand experience outdoors, whether within the school grounds, in urban green spaces, in Scotland's countryside or in wilder environments. Such experiences motivate our children to become successful learners and to develop as healthy, confident, enterprising and responsible citizens. Well-constructed and well-planned outdoor learning helps develop the skills of enquiry, critical thinking and reflection necessary for our children to meet the social, economic and environmental challenges of life in the 21st century. Outdoor learning connects children with the natural world, with our built heritage and our culture and society, and encourages lifelong involvement and activity in Scotland's outdoors.

Different outdoor learning experiences offer opportunities for personal and learning skills development in areas such as communication, problem solving, information technology, working with others and thinking skills.

Learning in the outdoors can make significant contributions to literacy, numeracy and health and wellbeing.



In literacy there are opportunities to use different texts: the spoken word, charts, maps, timetables and instructions. In numeracy there are opportunities to measure angles and calculate bearings and journey times. In health and wellbeing there are opportunities to become physically active in alternative ways and to improve emotional wellbeing and mental health. Therefore, outdoor learning offers many opportunities for learners to deepen and contextualise their understanding within curriculum areas, and for linking learning across the curriculum in different contexts and at all levels.

As part of our improvement plan priorities we are developing our approaches to outdoor learning. We are working with an outdoor learning and play charity called Learning Through Landscapes. So far, our staff team have attended 2 training sessions, both of which have provided lots of practical ideas and suggestions on how to take learning outdoors. Our grassy area above the carpark will be developed over the coming weeks and will be the focal point for our outdoor learning activities. You may have noticed we have started to plant a willow shaped classroom in this area.

100% indicated that the information they received helped them to understand how their child is learning and progressing. We received very helpful suggestions regarding the booking of appointment times and this will be investigated further. All the responses will be discussed at our next Parent Council meeting.
